1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Named in honor of the late Panampilly Govinda Menon, a renowned lawyer, freedom fighter, and statesman, the college aims to impart quality education and nurture the intellectual and personal growth of students in the region. Since its inception, PMGC has focused on providing affordable and accessible education to students from all socio-economic backgrounds. Over the years, the college has grown significantly in terms of infrastructure, academic programs, and faculty strength. It has made a significant impact on the educational landscape of Chalakudy and its neighboring regions. Established in 1975, and affiliated to the University of Calicut, the college is wholly owned and managed by the Government of Kerala Recognized by the University Grants Commission, and included in 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act, the college is also accredited by NAAC at 'B' Grade on four point scale in 2015 with grade point of 2.66.

The college offers five Undergraduate programmes in branches of learning such as Commerce, Economics, Mathematics, Political Science and Physics, five Post Graduate programmes in branches of learning such as Commerce, Economics, Mathematics, Political Science and Malayalam. All the Post Graduate departments are Research centers as well which is an extraordinarily scarce and exceptional marvel and an unparalleled rarity. In addition to academics, PMGC emphasizes the overall development of its students by offering various extracurricular activities and opportunities. The college has a National Service Scheme (NSS) unit, which encourages students to engage in community service and social initiatives. The college also has a vibrant cultural scene, with clubs and associations that promote arts, music, dance, and literature, allowing students to showcase their talents and develop new interests. Over the years, Panampilly Memorial Government College has built a reputation for academic excellence and has produced numerous successful graduates who have made significant contributions in various fields. 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Since the last accreditation, the College started PG programme in Malayalam and UG Programme in Physics and all the PG Departments are elevated to Research Centres under University of Calicut offering Ph. D programmes in Commerce, Economics, Political Science, Mathematics, and Malayalam. The College is

successful in completing 100% POs, PSOs and COs offered under CBCSS. During the period of Pandemic, the Collage was successful in dealing the situation by making use of the blended learning method, which is also reflected in the academic performance of students during the assessment period. The recognitions bagged by the College include top positions in University Examination results, continuous success stories of students in UGC/NET examinations, achievements in Sports, Games and Cultural activities at Zonal and University levels. Even though the academic activities of the institution are based on the broad curriculum frame work of the University of Calicut; it takes special efforts to transform the curriculum to suit its geopolitical needs.

The institution takes utmost care in choosing optional subjects suitable to the requirements of students, which enables them to be easily absorbed into the job market .The curriculum practice is designed to meet the twin objectives of higher education: individual as well as social. The immense possibilities offered by ICT are thoroughly explored. Smart boards, high speed Internet, Inflibnet, Satellite Interactive Terminal (SIT), computer labs, language lab, sports and games, well-stacked library, and print and electronic journals – all contribute towards advanced level of dissemination of knowledge. To contribute to the employability skills of students, various tailor-made programmes such as Additional Skills Acquisition Programme (ASAP) Scholar Support Programme (SSP) Walk with a Scholar (WWS) are embedded in the scheme of things during the assessment period. For the all-round development of the personality of students various programmes such as NSS, Quiz Club, Tourism Club, Film Club, Women's cell, Literary Clubs, Cultural Forums, Bhoomithra Sena Club, Entrepreneurial Development Club, Debate Club etc are functioning in the College. The concerns of the institution on administrative and academic issues are rightly communicated to the university through its representatives in the Syndicate and the Board of Studies.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The teaching-learning process at the college places students' diverse needs and satisfaction at its centre by instituting such participatory methods such as debates, discussions, presentations, Peer Teaching etc. These methods aim to foster critical thinking and practical application of knowledge. Additionally, seminars and presentations on contemporary issues help students gain a comprehensive understanding of socio-economic and scientific matters. The college also utilizes case studies and projects to provide hands-on learning experiences and enhance research skills. Peer teaching, debates, and discussions are further incorporated to encourage active student engagement. To enhance the teaching-learning process, the college utilizes ICT-enabled classrooms, including smart boards, smart TVs, and video conferencing facilities. It also offers a well-equipped Computer Science lab and INFLIBNET lab, providing students with access to digital content. Ever since the pandemic, the teaching-learning process has been utilising platforms like YouTube, WhatsApp, and Google Meet etc. to deliver online education and e-content. The teaching-learning process follows an Outcome-Based Education model, aligning with specific program and course objectives. It aims to cultivate in-depth knowledge, promote employability, and develop research aptitude besides equipping students with digital literacy skills. The process fosters subject-specific skills, problem-solving abilities, and decision-making competencies. It also encourages lifelong learning, practical skills, and awareness of social contexts. In summary, the college's teaching-learning process revolves around student engagement, ICT integration, and outcome-based education. By employing participatory methods and focusing on holistic development, the college prepares students for success in their academic pursuits and future careers. The evaluation of the teaching-learning process is transparent and consists of 80 percent external end semester examination and 20 percent internal continuous evaluation. The external evaluation primarily relies on the performance of students in written examinations, which are conducted using scientifically designed question papers. Project works and viva voce also form a part of the external evaluation. On the other hand, theinternal continuous evaluation takes place at the college level and encompasses variousaspects such as internal assessment test papers, seminars, assignments, and classroomattendance. Thus, the evaluation processis carefully structured to assessthe students' in-depth knowledge and understanding of the expected outcomes.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution offers an appropriate academic and innovative ecosystem that promises the holistic development of the student community. It envisions a deep-rooted outcome and value-based education system through the proper conduct of both curricular and extra-curricular activities in a balanced manner. Competent faculties of the institution adapt well with the changing needs of the learning community and are in a constant endeavor to improve the quality of teaching -learning process. As part of professional enrichment process, faculty members of the institution are actively participating in FDPs, seminars, works shops, short term courses and conferences with high interest. More than 185 faculty participations in seminars and 50 paper presentations are recorded during the assessment year. Passion towards self-improvement through continuous learning process has made them more research oriented. During the assessment period, the institution has mobilized resources for financing various research projects, seminars and workshops. MOU's and linkages are in place facilitating knowledge sharing, consultancy services and research extension activities. Information regarding research publications of the faculties is made available to the academia through the institution website. Eighty-two faculty publications materialized during the current assessment period and many of the journals are part of UGC Care List. Etude, the peer reviewed research journal owned by the institution publishes invited quality contributions from the faculties of other institutions as well. As part of extension and outreach programmes, exemplary initiatives are undertaken under the auspicious of NSS Unit, Teens' Club, Bhoomitrasena Club and Red Ribbon Club. It broadly covers social and agriculture related extension activities that come to the common good for all. Such initiatives have sensitized the students with social issues, made them more socially committed and more compassionate. The institution has received honours and awards in this regard.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

In order to conduct the academic programmes in an effective manner, the college has adequate infrastructure facilities, which includes three academic blocks, examination halls, library, auditorium, seminar hall, canteen, indoor stadium, 400 meter track, UV water facility, rainwater harvesting, staff quarters and Girls hostel.

The college has a sufficient number of spacious smart classrooms and a well-furnished smart air-conditioned seminar hall with a seating capacity of 100. Apart from the main seminar hall, the college has a mini well-furnished seminar hall with a seating capacity of 70 and an auditorium capable of accommodating more than 1000 participants and an open stage and courtyard. The college is equipped with well-designed spacious Physics and Chemistry laboratories. There are two examination halls (20 thousand sq feet each) exclusively for conducting internal and external examinations. The college maintains a well-furnished canteen having the capacity to accommodate more than 100 students at a time and provides subsidized food to students.

There is a well-managed computerized library with KOHA software and OPAC facility with more than (42000) forty-two thousand books and the library is an official subscriber of the N-LIST. The college maintains an EDUSAT room with a theatre atmosphere. The three storied administrative block consists of Administrative office, Principal room, IQAC office, a mini seminar hall, which ensures the smooth functioning of the institution. The college has hostel facility having an intake of 100 students and for staff, there is 1 principal

quarters, 4 teacher's quarters and 2 quarters for non teaching staff. Centralised UV drinking water treatment facility is also available. The college is on the way to change to solar energy and as an initiative, the administrative block is partly working in solar energy.

The college has state of art sports facilities which consist of a 400-meter standard athletic track, Outdoor basketball court, Handball court, Jumping pit, Indoor stadium, Badminton courts, fitness centre, gymnasium and a place for yoga and meditation. An adequate number of tool kits have been arranged to promote indoor games.

Student Support and Progression

The College has conceived a number of programmes ensuring comprehensive support and consistent progression of students throughout their program of study in the college. We make sure that students are formally represented and involved in all these programmes. The college union representatives are an ex-officio member of the College Development Committee and Anti-narcotic Cell. The College union chairperson acts as president of all programmes conducted by the college union. The Arts Club Secretary, an elected position in the college union is in charge of the programmes aiming at the development of artistic talents of students. The General Captain under the guidance of faculty of Physical Education takes the role of a mentor of the physical fitness programmes. University Union Councilor (UUC) is an elected students' representative who acts as an intermediary between the university and the college. The reserved female student posts of the Vice Chairperson and the Joint Secretary ensure gender equity.

Every year our students receive different types of scholarships and e-grants from the government in different categories such as SC, ST, OBC, BPL, Single Girl Child, Minority and Differently Abled. Such grants are developed according to the government's policies for higher education institutions. Various programmes are organized to enhance the students' soft skills, language and communication skills, and life skills. The programmes for physical fitness, mental well-being (Jeevani), yoga, sports championships, collegiate and intercollegiate competitions are all aimed to make education a comprehensive one.

Coaching is given to prepare students to excel in competitive exams like UGC NET, PSC and Bank tests. There are Career Guidance Cell, SSP and WWS for placement and guidance to address career, academic and personality development. The college has a well-defined mechanism which includes Anti ragging and Anti-harassment cell and Grievance Redressal cell to address promptly various grievances of students. Every year a very good number of students pass out with excellent records. They pursue higher education in prestigious institutions. Many find placements in small as well as big establishments. Active PTA and Alumni are the other two strong pillars of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The College is committed to give quality education and service to students and other stake holders. The day to day administration and governance of the College is monitored by the College Council, IQAC, the Academic Monitoring Committee, Purchase Committee, Discipline Committee, Examination Committee etc. along with the participation of CDC, PTA and the College Union. The College functions under the supervision and control of Department of Collegiate Education, Government of Kerala. The Principal, with advice from the Staff Council, take appropriate decisions regarding the functioning of the College on the basis of its stated vision, mission and objectives. The activities of the College are executed through Heads of the Departments and

various committees and forums formed every year. Planning and monitoring is performed by IQAC and Staff Council. The Council meets once in a month or as and when needed. The Principal collects feedback about teaching-learning, office administration, Library, Departments and other units. The teachers and staff have the freedom to air their views and grievances to the Principal.

In order to maintain transparency in all actions of the institution, a mechanism is instituted at the college and government level. Internal audit is conducted every year at the end of the academic year. It covers actual physical verification of cash balance, stock registers, valuables and other activities in the college. Academic audits are conducting ever year to assess the performance of all departments. Auditing of accounts is done by the Office of the Directorate of Collegiate Education, Accountant General and Chartered Accountants to ensure financial transparency.

The IQAC was established according to the College guidelines takes lead role in institutionalizing and ensuring quality in the execution of plans and policies of the college in academic and other allied activities. To ensure quality of academic activities IQAC pioneers subject allocation, preparation of individual time table, Department time table, Master time table, conduct of Internal Evaluation process, and student feedback. Departmental academic plans are also prepared and given to students. A perspective Master Plan has been prepared and submitted to the Govt. for approval and funding.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college envisions a gender sensitive, eco-friendly, inclusive campus, characterised by democratic approach in administrative, curricular and co-curricular areas, and in the relationship among the students, and between teachers and students. The pillars of curricular and co-curricular activities, and a robust structure along with healthy culture of growing and learning together help us to nurture a gender sensitive generation. Gender based co-curricular activities under the auspices of women's cell, Jeevani, NSS and departmental initiatives, dynamic curriculum, and gender-friendly structures broadened the mental and moral compass of the students. The admission modalities for students, appointment procedure of teachers, involvement of college in the times of environmental catastrophe, differently-abled buildings, outreach programmes with the community, celebration of constitutional events bear testimony to the fact that the notion of inclusivity is embedded in our institution. The campus exists for students, from academics to non- academics, scholastic to non-scholastic areas, it is the students who lead and coordinate; from internal evaluation mechanism to the conduct of programmes and elections, college has it uniqueness. The creation of an eco-friendly campus has been a consistent priority, witnessing an evolutionary growth from virgin forest, herbal garden to organic farming. Thus we have been consistent in our best practice titled, 'ECO-FRIENDLY CAMPUS". An action plan for scientific waste management and rainwater harvesting took the best practice to the next level. The best practice, Healthy Youth for Healthy Tomorrow through Education and Empowerment unleashed the potential of the college to contribute to become a social bridge. Research projects are designed to contribute towards the social amelioration of the community. The functionaries like vimukthi, anti-narcotic cell, Bhoomitrasena, NSS and PTA work along with the college to wean away students from substance addiction and to channelize the energy of students into creative activities, so as to groom healthy youth for healthy tomorrow. Thus the college realizes that education is not merely about learning, but a holistic process, whereby institutional values need to be transformed as best practices in the real life of students, faculty and the society.

The curriculum is divided into different parts and these parts are covered and completed within the time in an effective way. The proposals of the Boards of Studies are scrutinized at multiple levels by the Dean of faculties, Academic Council and the Syndicate. It is revised appropriately once in three years considering latest developments in the area of learning. To make the curriculum more comprehensive, various teaching aids Besides co-curricular activities debates/declamation/lectures used. it. like experts/seminars/workshops etc. areorganised. The teachers adopt learner centered ICT enabled methods of teaching and also make use of group discussion, brain storming, blended learning, peer teaching with an interdisciplinary perspective. Besides the final exams, the college conducts internal examinations and the concerned teachers evaluate these answer sheets and the record is maintained by the Department and is sent to the University to get added to the final result of students. The staff is encouraged to attend research programmes like workshops, conferences, seminars and extension lectures. They are motivated to write research papers for various conferences and get them published. Academic calendar of the college is prepared every year at the very onset of the session. 3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1

Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.

Response:

The college is closely knit with its neighbourhood through its extension and outreach programmes with a focus on inculcating social values among students, upholding the notion of Institutional Social Responsibility. Various structured initiatives are undertaken by the college with an intention to instil social commitment among students, to make them more empathetic and to sensitise students to social issues thereby contributing to the community well-being in a holistic manner. Nature camp, planting of trees on Environment Day both inside and outside the campus, Gender sensitisation camp, AIDS awareness camp, awareness campaign on importance of eco friendliness, vegetable seed distribution, ward level campaigns on My waste- My responsibility and blood donation campaigns are organised. A data base of the blood group of students is maintained as referral points for blood donations in case of any emergencies. The Red Ribbon Club is instrumental in educating students and promoting voluntary blood donation. Associating with hospitals in the vicinity, an eye donation campaign was organised and consent forms regarding eye donations are handed over to the hospital authorities. Flood relief centre was opened in the college accommodating over one thousand localities who were badly hit by the 2018 deluge in no time for a one-week period. The NSS unit of the college took the lead role in the conduct of the camp and students voluntarily participated in the relief works co-ordinated by the NSS unit of the college. The Honourable Chief Minister, Sri Pinarayi Vijayan, the then MLA and MP, Sri B.D. Devassy and Sri. Innocent visited the camp in the college and it heightened the morale of the camp volunteers of our college. During Covid pandemic, the institution organised awareness campaigns on Covid pandemic and strategies to cope with it under different systems of medicines as Modern Medicine, Homeo medicine, Ayurvedic and Naturopathy were arranged. Further, the college has provided all facilities for vaccination and isolation of covid patients. Collaborating with Chalakudy Municipality, spoken Hindi campaign was organised with a focus to impart basic language skills. Department of Political Science and Institute of Parliamentary Affairs joined hands by conducting a one-day seminar on issues related to Parliamentary Democracy, where deliberations happened on the need to reform it and role of students as citizens. Several seminars on nature conservation were organised and more than one thousand samplings of varied varieties of trees on road side, on idle places, students' home and in the campus and Bhoomitrasena Club takes the lead role in this regard. The National Service Scheme, Bhoomitrasena Club, Teens Club, Red Ribbon Club and PTA are the key bodies in streamlining all the activities. Active and harmonious involvement of students as well as faculties are assured throughout the execution of each initiative.

3.4.2

Awards and recognitions received for extension activities from government / government recognised bodies

Response:

Concerted efforts by students led by the NSS unit of the college brought laurels to the institution. Chalakudy was one among the worst hit locations in the 2018 floods. In a state of chaos and panic the College turned shelter to hundreds of flood hit localites as well as migrants whose houses were inundated

with flood water over night. In no hesitation, the students whole heartedly participated in the relief works which was well co-ordinated by the NSS unit of the college. The entire exercise was constantly reviewed by the local authority and the college was honoured with the awardforBest Co-ordinated Camp by the Chalakudy Municipality. The college further had a moment of glory when the college was acclaimed for winning the Best Practicing College against Narcotic use by the Kerala State Excise Division. The NSS unit of the college organised awareness campaigns, online essay competition, online poster making competition, distribution and sticking of pamphlets/ stickers in public places in Chalakudy against tobacco use in this regard. Again, under the auspices of NSS, Harithasena started organic cultivation in the barren land inside the college compound. It went through two stages. The volunteers with the help of MGNREGS workers digged 127 pits for planting bitter gourd and snake gourd seeds. Organic pesticides and manures were applied and the volunteers sold the vegetables to the natives, teachers and students. Associating with Krishi Bhavan, Project Based Cultivation was launched with an allocation of Rs 81,000 for vegetable cultivation and earned Rs 21000 through its sale. The best practice award for organic farming at the college level under Sarojini Damodaran Foundation was also grabbed by the institution.

Response:

There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical facilities in the college. The college has three academic blocks and a separate building for a library, auditorium, canteen, indoor stadium and hostel. The College Council is the apex body responsible for the acquisition and maintenance of assets in the college. Maintenance of assets in the classroom is managed by tutors and overall supervision of departmental assets is done by respective HoDs.

The assets in the library are supervised and managed by the librarian. We have an established physical education department in the college and the assets of the department- fitness equipment, indoor and outdoor sports kits and other equipment are maintained by the professor in charge of Physical Education. The teacher in charge of the Computer Science and INFLIBNET maintained Computers, Laptops and other electronic equipment of the department. The superintendent takes care of procedural formalities for the acquisition of assets in the college. Asset Registers are maintained and updated regularly for every department and other centers separately. HoDs maintain the Asset Register intact signed by the Principal.

Periodical physical verification of the assets is done every year. The acquisition of assets is governed by the purchase procedures of the Government of Kerala. The college has a sufficient number of spacious smart classrooms and a well-furnished smart air-conditioned seminar hall with a seating capacity of 100. Apart from the main seminar hall, the college has a mini well-furnished seminar hall with a seating capacity of 70 and an auditorium capable of accommodating more than 1000 participants.

There is a well-managed computerized library with KOHA software and OPAC facility. There are more than (42000) forty-two thousand books and the library is an official subscriber of the N-LIST of UGC. The college maintains an EDUSAT room with a theatre atmosphere capable of receiving and transmitting online audio and video resources.

There are two examination halls (20 thousand sq feet each) exclusively for conducting internal and external examinations. The college is equipped with well-designed spacious Physics and Chemistry laboratories and other modern equipment of high quality for use by students and teachers. The college maintains a well-furnished canteen having the capacity to accommodate more than 100 students at a time and provides subsidised food to students.

The college has state of art sports facilities which consist of a 400-meter standard athletic track, Outdoor

basketball court, Handball court and Jumping pit. The college has an Indoor stadium, Badminton courts, an excellent fitness centre for a gymnasium and a place for yoga and meditation. The indoor stadium is capable of accommodating six shuttle courts and four basketball courts. A sufficient number of portable stands, nets and other equipment have been arranged for easy use by students. The college also promotes indoor games like chess, caroms and table tennis. An adequate number of tool kits have been arranged to promote indoor games.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Response:

Our College library was established in year 1975. It has been completely relocated to spacious double stored building in 2022. Now it has a collection of more than 42012 books on various topics of both faculty and students. The library occupies the area of 15000 square feet, with spacious stacking space for general and reference collections. In the ground floor General, competitive examinations, Political science, Economics, Malayalam collections, Journals & Magazine section, Newspaper reading section, Circulation counter, Property counter are accommodated. First floor is stored with Mathematics, Science, Commerce, English, Hindi, Computer science, History collections. Second floor filled with Reference sections and Research library. Each floor has reading areas. Every day on an average more than 70 students visit the college library for borrowing books and for referencing. The library provides 92 seating

for users in reading sections.

The college library is open for students and staff from 9.30am to 5pm on all working days including Saturdays. Students enter the library and log into the register before moving to the racks. The library offers Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) for searching of the document in the library. All the books in the library are bar coded. This helps the circulation counter in issue and return of books quickly. Library Advisory Committee is constituted to address the issues involved for the development of the library. Library functions under its guidance and supervision.

Criterion 6 - Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1

The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.

Response:

The college is committed to ensure accountability, transparency, inclusiveness, empowerment, equity and participative management. The entire activities in the college are planned so as to ensure equity and sustainable social development through education and empowerment thereby ensures vision and mission of the college. The admission process is done in a very transparent and inclusive manner as per the guidelines of the Government. The representation of marginalised, socially economically and backward communities is ensured program wise, discipline wise and in the college as a whole. The appointments to various positions in the college are done in a very transparent and equitable manner by Kerala Public Service Commission leaving no chance for favouritism and other interests. The utilizations of funds are governed by the guidelines and procedures of CPWD/PWD. The activities in the college are supervised and managed by the college council headed by the Principal, which is the highest democratic administrative body of the college. It consists of Principal, Vice- Principal, and Heads of departments, two elected faculty representatives, superintendent and librarian. IQAC in the college plans execute and document academic and other activities. Vice-Principal assists Principal in executing various decisions of the council. The superintendent is responsible for proper documentation and compliance with various rules and regulations in force. Librarian is in charge of the books, journals, periodicals and other assets in the library. All academic activities are functionally planned and managed by respective heads of departments in consultation with other faculties and students in the department. Tutors are assigned for all classes and are responsible for maintaining student data card, attendance register, health register and uploading of APC and internals. Co curricular activities are organized under the coordinator ship of a faculty of the college.

The decentralizing and participative management of the college administration is reflected in many events conducted by the college during these five academic years. The college conducted **Sasthrayan 2018 in** March 2018 with a vision to uplift the college to a centre of excellence by exposing achievements, scientific contributions etc to the public and thereby instilling a scientific temper. This initiative was framed out under the guidance of the RUSA State Project Directorate. A committee comprising of the Principal, Vice Principal, General Convener, Department Heads, representatives from students union, NSS, PTA, Alumnae, and the office and various other sub-committees were formed for this purpose. The college acknowledged the participation of the local governing bodies like Panchayath ward members and Municipality.

Management of the flood rescue camp providing shelter for more than 2300 flood affected villagers was one of the unforgettable events happened in the year 2018. The whole hearted co operation of all stake holders made it possible to ensure procurement, preparation and distribution of food items, collection and distribution of clothes and medicines, power supply, health and hygiene as well as mental and physical

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

College Development Council (CDC) and College Council are the higher level administrative bodies in the college. The college invariably functions as per the guidelines of the government, UGC and the University of Calicut. All decisions are implemented in the college in a democratic and transparent manner under the supervision of administrative bodies and faculty representatives. All permanent appointments are done in a very transparent and inclusive manner by the Kerala Public Service Commission. The promotion, placement, periodical increments and other service related matters are governed by the Kerala Service Rules of Government of Kerala and are executed by the Director of Collegiate Education. Academic activities in the college are functionally headed by respective Heads of Departments and Teachers in Charge (Tutor). The admissions to UG, PG and Research programme of the college are done in a transparent manner as per the guidelines of the Government of the Kerala and the University of Calicut ensuring representations from all social diversity. Adequate reservations are ensured for socially and economically backward/deprived communities. At the college level the Admission Committee headed by a nodal officer, ensures timely admission of students under the Common admission Process (CAP) considering all diversities. The curriculum of academic courses is designed by the University and its effective implementation at the college level is ensured by the IQAC. The teaching plan is prepared semester wise and daily basis. The Heads of Departments ensure effective implementation of tutorial system and supervise subject allocation, preparation of department and individual time table of faculty members and leave registers. Vice-Principal and Superintendent summarize the department time tables and the master time table of the college. Vice-Principal supports the Principal in all academic and allied activities and ensures the execution of the decision of the administrative bodies. The college follows hourly attendance system. HoDs compile attendance and report to the Principal in time. The internal examination committee conducts two internal examinations in every semester as per the guidelines of the University of Calicut and the summative assessment is conducted by the University at the end of each semester. The results of the internal evaluation are published in the department and uploaded to the University for incorporating in the consolidated mark list. The college maintains collaboration with industry to promote campus placements. The Research Committee encourages faculties to pursue research, take up projects, publish research articles and present them in national and international conferences. The promotions, placements and other service matters of faculty members are screened by IQAC. There is a three tier grievance redress mechanism for addressing the problems among faculties. A successful implementation of e-governance is visible in conduct of examinations and student admission. The planning and developmental activities are carried out electronically by incorporating software like 'PRICE', 'DDFS' for administration tasks. The college uses PFMS platform for utilizing central government funds and the purchases are carried out through

GEM (Government E-Market). The routine works of the library like accessioning, classification, cataloguing, circulation and report generating is being carried through KOHA software.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The college has a very good Performance Appraisal system in tune with the appraisal system followed by the Director of Collegiate Education. Every year, performance of staff has been appraised in a standard format encompassing all facets of its activities. Performance of faculty members are assessed on teaching learning process, research extension and publications, involvement in extracurricular activities, involvement in evaluation and assessment process and professional achievements. Every faculty fills in the Self Appraisal Report (SAR) in triplicate and submits to Heads of Departments. Heads of Departments makes a factual verification of claims of the faculty and submits to IQAC with his remarks and recommendation. IQAC verifies SAR and gets it approved by the Principal. Original SAR is returned to the faculty and the duplicate is filed in the department and the triplicate is filed with IQAC for records. Student's feedback on teachers is taken regularly at the end of every semester.

The college is committed to ensure implementation of proper welfare measures to teaching and non-teaching staff. All promotions, placements, annual increments and other service benefits are awarded in time. All monetary benefits are credited online in time to the bank account of the beneficiaries. All Staff are provided with Provident Fund, Gratuity, Leave encashment and cashless medical facilities (MEDISEP of Government of Kerala) up to Rupees three lakhs per head. The MEDISEP facility is available for dependants also. All employees are eligible for 15-20 days casual leave. Employees are also eligible for Commuted leave, Maternity leave, Paternity leave and LWA. Employees are provided with subsidized healthy nutritious food in the college canteen. Staff Quarters facility is available for teaching and non teaching staff and the Principal. Free unlimited WIFI facility is provided to all and is free to use the database of the N-LIST of UGC. Staff club acts for the welfare and recreation of the staff. Recreation room, fitness Centre, Yoga Centre, Recognition for achievements, Staff tour, counselling centres etc. are other facilities provided to ensure physical and mental fitness.

The teaching faculties of this college are continuously trained with innovative teaching methodologies in order to equip them for the emerging trends in the higher education of the state. They are provided with periodical enrichment programme like orientation courses, refresher courses in respective disciplines, short term courses offered by UGC-HRDC and SWAYAM MOOC courses. Teaching and non teaching staff also participate in other faculty development programme and induction programme conducted by the Higher Education Department of Kerala and IMG as well. Teaching and non teaching staff is provided with training programme like soft skill development, financial management, yoga and health awareness. During the pandemic period the college moved successfully with strategic perspectives to cope up with the challenging situation of shifting to online platforms of learning, teaching and its continuous assessment. Training sessions were arranged by the IQAC to equip teachers to handle online classes. Many teachers attended online training programme conducted by the Higher Education Department of Kerala on the electronic platforms of education.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The financial management of the college is done in an effective and efficient manner keeping a clear cut strategy for resource mobilisation and optimal utilization to realize the vision and mission of the Institution. Proposal for funds is forwarded to the concerned agency after discussion in the College Council. Various committees evaluate and examine the utilization of funds and assure that the funds are utilized for which it is granted and the income and expenditure are properly audited and filed. The financial transactions related to purchases and funds availed for expenditure of conferences, activities of academic initiatives like WWS, SSP, activities of other clubs etc. are audited by the Office of the Accountant General and Director of Collegiate Education Thiruvananthapuram. The utilization statements along with all details of these expenditures are subject to internal audit every year. All activities in the college are statutorily subject to two external audits; one by the Director of Collegiate Education and the second by the Accountant General, Government of Kerala. The utilization of the funding by the Central Government from RUSA and UGC for infrastructure development, MP fund, MLA fund is audited by the Chartered Accountants and Accountant General. The P T A (Parent Teachers Association) offers financial assistance at times of necessity. These transactions are audited by Chartered Accountants. Internal audit is conducted every year at the end of the academic year. It covers actual physical verification of cash balance, stock registers, valuables and other activities in the college. The duty of internal audit is assigned to a team of members, headed by an appropriate faculty. Anomalies if any are looked into seriously and corrective measures were taken to set it right. Apart from statutory external audits, utilizations by college functionaries are audited by Chartered Accountants invariably. The accounts of the Alumnae Association are filed separately and audited. Due importance is given for

maintaining the accounts with clarity and errors are minimized. Adhering to the suggestions of various auditing agencies, necessary changes are made. Tuition fees and other fees of students are collected as per the orders of the Government and remitted in time through proper channel.

The college always appreciates mobilization of funds from all sources. Generally Successful Alumni, Faculty Members, NGOs, Corporate Bodies and other well wishers come forward to support the college as and when a necessity arises. The Alumni of the college conducts annual gatherings and is committed to cater to the financial needs of the college and often volunteers for various charities in support to the deserving students. It also supports to the environmental development of the campus. The faculty members are generous to donate a part of their salary to support the charitable services of the college. It is not a difficult task to raise funds for medical treatment of students within a short notice. Also the staff club has donated to the family of the members who departed during service. Absolute transparency and accountability is ensured in this regard.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC of this college was constituted in 2009 for enhancing and sustaining the quality of the institution. It acts as the coordinating agency and works in hand with the college council, for institutionalizing and ensuring quality in the execution of plans and policies of the college in academic and other allied activities as per the seven criteria specified by NAAC. Yearly academic audit, compilation of AQAR and SSR, data collection for AISHA are carried out by IQAC towards this end. To ensure quality of academic activities, IQAC pioneers subject allocation, preparation of individual time table, department time table, Master time table, conduct of Internal Evaluation process, and student feedback. Every faculty prepares a teaching plan at the beginning of every semester considering allocated syllabus and individual time table in agreement with departmental and Master time table. Teaching planning is prepared hourly basis and is set to progress and complete within the time allotted. First internal assessment is conducted after completion of 40 per cent of syllabus and second on 80 per cent of syllabus. IQAC ensures periodic progression of syllabus through heads of departments at periodical intervals. A multifaceted and comprehensive curriculum and the student support academic initiatives need to be updated with regular feedback from stakeholders. IQAC has initiated feedback appraisal as a benchmarking measure to look into the strengths and weakness and look forward to undertake corrective measure to strengthen its performance. Remedial classes are arranged for slow learners and appropriate guidance are given for students having high end ambitions. IQAC reviews teaching learning process and academic progression is evaluated and corrective measures are suggested. IQAC ensures delivery of academic content at the level expected of it. IQAC encourages and guides faculty to introduce

innovations in field of teaching and learning to bring in positive impact and also to take up research activities. IQAC helps to organize orientation and motivation class for students and staff at periodical intervals. It promotes faculty participation in conferences, workshops, FDPs, Refresher and Orientation Courses. IQAC guides the self appraisal system of the college and screens the proposals for the CAS placements of the faculties as per the UGC guidelines. ICT skills of faculty are enhanced through orientation programmes and guidance is given to the faculty to be involved in process of ICT based teaching which is a prerequisite of this digital era. Online platforms like MOOC, YouTube, SWAYAM NPTEL, Google classrooms, Google Meet and WhatsApp are used by the faculties as modes of transaction of curriculum, especially on the wake of COVID pandemic. Students are introduced to N List, as additional sources of information related to their curriculum. IQAC plays key role in popularizing quality policies followed by the college with respect to Swatchatha, Drinking water, Cleanliness, Energy conservation, Rain water harvesting/recharging, Waste management and management of Non Degradable waste. It plays vital role to ensure ragging free, harassment free, pollution free green campus. It plays an apex role to obtain appropriate certifications by appropriate authorities at all levels.

Response:

We have been resolute in creating a gender sensitive campus, which is reflected in the curricular, cocurricular activities, and gender-sensitive structures of the college. The majority of extra- curricular programmes were organized under the auspices of women's cell, Jeevani, NSS and departmental initiatives. Women's cell offers structural and functional support to gender equity endeavors; promotes an enabling environment for boys, girls and LGBT plus community. Within a span of five years, we conducted programmes that addressed diverse issues:- importance of personal hygiene, particularly during menstruation, conducted erudite talks on marginalization of women, dual lives of working women ,historical depiction of women, legal rights and protective mechanism, unorganized women and their rights, davit women, identity politics, feminism in film, problems of girl child, gender neutral dress code and gender rights, freedom and choice, domestic violence; conducted competition to recapture the lives of past woman; organized informative sessions regarding self- defence and first aid; held motivational classes, stress buster talks, orientation programmes and sharing spaces for alleviating the mood of students, with the aid of Jeevani. The redressal mechanisms of women's cell and Jeevani function in professional manner, respecting the privacy of the students. The institution made a timely effort by conducting online programmes during covid pandemic. The interactive nature of co-curricular activities broadened the mental and moral compass of the students.

The component of gender approach is an invariable part of our curriculum, especially in the case of PG & Research Department of Political Science, PG&Research Department of Malayalam and language departments of Hindi and English. The PG Department of Political Science covers gender issues comprehensively:-the paper, Concepts of political science includes feminism as one of the major themes in contemporary politics; Issues in Indian politics, covers marginalized sections-Davits and tribes, women and children, and dalit, adivasis, women, OBCS, transgender are included in the paper, state, society and political process in Kerala. The paper, Modern Indian political thought introduces the life of Pandita Ramabai. The Elective course, Human rights includes feminist approaches and important legislations like the sexual harassment of women at workplace (prevention, prohibition and redressal) Act, 2013, etc. The Department of Political science offers open course for the paper, Human Rights to the students of other departments with the aim to bring awareness on several challenges, especially related to woman. The poems, stories, plays of the language department include lessons on gender, liberation and democratization of personal life; Reading from the fringes, Fire by Nikita Gill on feminism, Accept Me by Vidya are some of the examples. Dynamic syllabus and vibrant programmes have empowered the students both in the realms of knowledge and practice.

The gender friendly facilities include:-RUSA-sponsored Women Amenity Centre, Incinerator, Girl's

The Common Admission Programme of the Calicut University gives priority to both the marginalized and meritorious students through democratic admission procedure, whereby backward castes, BPL categories, differently –abled, sports students are adequately represented. Our institution has an open attitude towards LGBT plus students .The College is accessible to differently-abled students through ramp facilities in the entrance of the buildings, open stage and hostel. The gender friendly facilities like RUSA-sponsored Women Amenity Centre, Incinerator, Girl's hostel, crèche and CCTV security cameras provide a secure environment for girl students and female employees. During the global pandemic, teachers were ordained as sect oral Magistrates and students became COVID warriors; gave

awareness classes to the public. The college hostel is a haven for those from far flung areas and reservation is provided for SC, ST and Lakshadweep students. The College has always been in the forefront in conducting outreach programmes. Socioeconomic Survey was conducted by our students in the nearby wards in 2017. For clean, healthy and safe Chalakudy, bleaching powder was distributed to prevent rain-borne diseases. Free Cancer detection camp in cooperation with RCC was organized for the nearby residents. After the flood, in alliance with Kerala Pollution Control Board, water test was done in the nearby wells. Damage Assessment Survey was conducted in 2018 to assess the economic impact of the catastrophe. NSS under the banner, "Adopt a school scheme" adopted Chalakudy Govt Boys LP School for one year in 2018 and constructed library for the school in 2019. In 2018, students and staff joined together to improve the infrastructure and material quality of the adjacent anganwadi. The college campus was the venue for flood relief camp; became a second home to the displaced people and ample measures were taken to tackle physical, psychological and linguistic problems. The value of being a donor is taught to students through blood and eye donation classes. To impart constitutional values, the college commemorated important events like Gandhi Jayanthi, International Tolerance Day, Kerala Formation Day, Constitution Day, World AIDS Day, Girl child day, Republic day, Independence day, International day for Elimination of Violence against women, National Education Day, National Girl Child Day, World Earth Day, International Women's Day, world peace Day, National Sports Day, National Youth Day, National Voters Day, World Earth Day ,World Environment Day, etc.The programmes made the students, teachers and employees contemplate on those eventful dates that changed the course of history; to imbibe the spirit of constitution and imprint in their minds, democratic and pluralistic values. The appointment procedure of teachers, admission modalities of the students, differently-abled friendly buildings, and outreach programmes for the community, celebration of historical and constitutional events bear testimony to the fact that the notion of inclusivity is embedded in our institution.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

Going green and being in nature has been our relentless goal. We have been consistent in our best practice titled, 'ECO-FRIENDLY CAMPUS", to inculcate a sense of eco-friendliness in the campus. To be a pro- active partner of eco-system, is what our institution aims, inspiring our students to become environment stewards. Sustainability in theory and practice has always been the motto of the campus based on a holistic approach ,comprising Herbal Garden, Virgin forest, Fruits Garden, Pachathuruthu, Irrigated organic farm, Rain water harvesting/recharging, Energy Conservation Policies and Scientific Waste Management System. We use to distribute Saplings and seedlings to the students and encourage them to create an eco-friendly atmosphere in their home. NSS, Bhoomitrasena Club, Social Forestry Department and PTA constantly watch and support green initiatives in the campus. The clubs promote planting trees outside the campus also. The verdant campus is home to beautiful variety of trees and

demonstrates the success of the initiatives of the college in spreading the importance of eco-Sensitiveness among students, staff and parents. Virgin forest (kanyavanam) has bloomed into a natural grove (nakshatravanam), harbouring birds; herbal garden consists of diverse medicinal plants and the array of trees are well maintained, giving an earthly ambience to the campus. A systematic, scientific and an elaborate organic cultivation within the campus is a positive realisation towards the goal for a greener campus and for that Green Army (Haritha sena) was formed exclusively for organic farming. The cultivated vegetables were marketed by opening a sale counter in the portico of the college. Students, teachers and natives supported the sale by auction. During Onam, these vegetables were marketed at Chalakudy town. The practice of organic farming has provided knowledge in sustainable agricultural methods, fine-tuned entrepreneurial skills of the students, and above all reinforced our continuous vision for a sustainable and eco- sensitive campus.

An action plan for scientific waste management for reducing the amount of waste generation took the best practice to the next level .The plan of action to prevent, reuse, classify and manage waste led to smart environmental choices by students and the academy in everyday life, influencing the entire community to make similar action, serving the real purpose of education-man as an ecological being. Rainwater harvesting mechanism of the college, done at two levels: - (a) Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting (b) Surface Run-off Rainwater Harvesting promotes water and energy conservation. The college pond is constructed using eco-friendly natural rocks. The best practice of the college is not a momentary thought but a vision that needs to be persevered as a futuristic and consistent goal.

The college has taken keen interest to instill values of education, apply knowledge in real life situations and education as a key to empowerment through the best practice, *Healthy Youth for Healthy Tomorrow through Education and Empowerment*. The college has immense potential to contribute for the social upliftment through mutual learning. Research projects are designed and planned to contribute towards the social amelioration of the community. The curiosity of the students is given a natural prodding by the teachers. Knowledge is what knowledge does. Keeping this in mind, the college endeavoured to apply theoretical knowledge for the goodness of the community. The research projects at Post Graduate and Undergraduate level, under the guidance of teachers made area-based studies in diverse areas. The title of the research projects is carefully calibrated to understand, analyse, assess and solve socio-economic and political problems. This academic practice brought a sea change in the perceptions of both the students as well as the teachers. Familiarization with cutting edge knowledge in their respective disciplines made the students inquisitive and to seriously think about research after post-graduation. The synergy of erudition and pragmatism reflected in these projects helped to get in touch with community. The student teachers in alliance acts as a knowledge- bridge, building and changing the lives of community.

The true purpose of education is to practice what is learned, bringing out goodness of social responsibility in human beings. The entire faculty and student community rose to the occasion by opening up the college infrastructure to the flood-hit people. The rehabilitation camp in our campus was the biggest one in Thrissur, offering solace to about 2300 families. To uplift the moods, psychological support was offered to the people devastated by the catastrophe. The social responsibility shown by our team when our State faced an unforeseen crisis exemplified once more the best practice; we have been constantly adhering to.

Social environment can make or mar students and our educational institution, like sentinels stand vigil against the ulterior motives of anti-social elements. An institution could transform into centres of excellence only when its pupils are exuberant, energetic and confident. Drug abuses and alcoholism are a bane that stunts the growth of future generation. The functionaries like vimukthi, anti-narcotic cell,

Bhoomitrasena, NSS and PTA work along with the college to wean away students from substance addiction and to channelize the energy of students into creative activities, so as to groom healthy youth for healthy tomorrow. Our students became the watch dog to protect the locality from drugs and related evils. Such positive interventions helped in realising inextricable bond between a healthy mind and body and the true meaning of education, bringing out goodness of social responsibility in students. In recognition of pro-active initiatives, our institution has received Vimukthi award, reminding us constantly that education should enable us to prevent and protect the student community from bad practices. Thus conceiving education as a holistic process, we could successfully execute the best practice, to build a healthy, educated and empowered youth.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Democratic approach is what makes Panampilly Memorial Government College distinct. Democratic involvement is seen in administrative, curricular and co-curricular activities, and in the comradeship between students and teachers. The administrative system as well as the academic structure of our college is democratic and decentralized. The internal evaluation system is streamlined in such a way that the college has three structured grievance redressal mechanism for the students at teacher, departmental and institutional levels, headed by the Principal. The highlight of our campus is that grievances, if any, are cleared at the level of teacher itself. The rapport between teachers and students are strong that few complaints have gone to higher level. College elections are conducted in free and fair manner; the election committee makes sure that modalities are fixed as per the guidelines and accordingly, students are given a real time experience of an election. The atmosphere of election gives students an opportunity to exhibit their debating skills, knowledge and perspectives regarding various socio-political issues. The uniqueness of our college is that an atmosphere of friendship and respect for democracy exist among the students even during the election, and teachers and student leaders take a lead role in ensuring a healthy atmosphere of competition. The freedom enjoyed by the students make them progressive, creative and confident. Student's representative is a member of College Development Committee. The Programmes like SSP, WWS, ASAP help to identify the faculties of the students and train them accordingly. The students are in their teens, an age of turbulent emotions and teachers in our college are well trained to deal them with empathy and maturity. Special counselling sessions were organized to bust out exam stress and student volunteers with the professional help of Jeevani identify vulnerable students who are in need of psychological support. In the backdrop of covid, counselling sessions were made online in cooperation with Jeevani centre. The mode of class is discussion than lecture method where out of the box ideas are encouraged. The titles of the research projects, assignments and seminars are decided mutually by the teacher and the concerned students on democratic basis. Teachers engage with students, instigate their questioning mind and acknowledge their work. Teachers are accessible and the students are encouraged to give out their opinions boldly. Such small moments have a big impact. To keep students on track, in spite of a formal internal evaluation system, other methods like viva, end of unit test, etc. are also used. Feedback is collected to assess the performance, subject knowledge and class presence

of the teachers, thereby cater to the diverse needs of the students. Though we set deadlines, empathetic, flexible and student centric approach is followed. Case by case sensitivity is shown; second chance is given to the deserved. The students from the Department of Economics, Political science, Commerce and Mathematics secured rank in UG and PG level, and cleared NET/JRF examinations.

In co-curricular activities too, students take the lead and have the freedom to discuss, express, interact, learn, unlearn, relearn and use their creative ideas. Teachers believe in the talent of the students and the programmes are stage managed completely by them. The observations of the teachers are valued by the students. The combined strength of accumulated wisdom of the teachers and the energy of the students did wonders by bagging prizes in D zone and our mime team got selected in a Malayalam movie (poomaram). The mime and skit are the prestigious items of our college; it is heartening to see the dedication in the practicing sessions and depth in the relationship between teachers and students. The students came out with flying colours, bagged first prize for mime, skit and folksong, reached south zone of University of Calicut. The college is proud to say that the lead singer of the folksong is now a lead member of the popular band group in Kerala, Aalmaram. Teachers prodded the students to participate in quiz and debate competition and it has not gone vain, our students came out successful in intercollegiate level based competition. Without any fear or guilt, our students, think, express and act confidently. In every activity, committees, clubs, discussions, meetings the student community is well represented and their voice is echoed, making our institution distinct for the students. Teachers, shoulder to shoulder with students could build a positive and friendly atmosphere in the campus, where the students feel the warmth of home and the strength of an institution, sharpening their academic, co-curricular and socioemotional skills.

Education is not merely about learning but a holistic process that bring changes in the perceptions, leading to character formation. The liberal environment of co-education educates students on mutual respect and gender equity. The programmes and seminars on gender taught the students about the importance of democratization of relationships and to come out from gender stereotypes to build a democratic model. The co-education system built confidence, encouraged diverse perspectives, and broadened the minds and attitudes of both faculty as well as students. Being sensitive is a quality that needs to be encouraged and is one of the biggest purposes of education. Teachers and students in our campus realised the importance of being empathetic and helpful to their specially-abled colleagues. A rotation among the students is arranged to help specially-abled students. Students volunteer to provide help as scribe in the examination for disabled students. This initiative boosted the confidence, brought positivity to their life and paved way for their integration to the mainstream student community. The entire college even arranged and relocated classes for the students who find it difficult to climb the stairs. By taking care of their exceptional friends, students learned primary lessons of education-being humane and democratic. Thus the impeccable democratic credential of the college shows our campus exists exclusively for the students.

- In the post accreditation period, one PG and one UG Programme was started and all the existing PG Departments are elevated to research centres.
- A fully automated library with OPAC facility and KOHA software INFLIBNET, Computer Lab, EDUSAT / ORICE room, N- LIST, free WIFI- by K- Phone and BSNLhas been accomplished
- Research grants, faculty participation in professional enrichment programs and research publications shows increased passion towards self-improvement among the faculties.
- Massive infrastructural developments have taken place with the guidance of PWD Department such as construction of a new administrative block with Principal Room, College Office, record room, IQAC room, and a discussion floor, a Science Block, a library block, well-designed Physics and Chemistry laboratories, two examination hall, a new canteen block with recreation amenities, girls' amenity centre, a staff recreation room, a creche,inter locked bricks paved courtyard roads, expansion of Girls' hostel and an open feel -free platform in front of the campus.
- Well-designed water and energy conservation policies and waste management system are well in place. Hygienic drinking water is assured through centralised UV water treatment system funded by MPLADS and LSG.
- A ground water recharging mechanism operated through effective rain water harvesting is put up with the support of Ground Water Authority.
- The college is on its way to shift to non-conventional solar energy and a part of the new administrative block works with solar energy.
- Official subscription to Haritha Karma Sena of Chalakudy Municipality allows regular and periodic collection of plastic and e-wastes.
- Complementing the green protocol initiatives, the Womens' Cell and Jeevani Centre joined hands in distributing menstrual cups to cent per cent female community of the institution.
- The institution has obtained 'Haritha Campus Certification' with 'A' grade from Haritha Kerala Mission, ISO 21000: 2018 certification for its excellence in Educational Management System and Tobacco Free Campus Certification from the Kerala State Excise Division for its relentless campaign against Tobacco use.
- The College Co-operative Society offers books and stationery to the students at affordable rates.

• Continuous rapport is maintained with the Alumni Association that supports us with their financial, administrative and professional knowledge.
